2. Mission





2. Students' Attendance




3. Destination of Exit Students




4. Students' Reading Habit

(b) Average Number of Reading Materials Borrowed within a School Year from the School Library per Student






2. Teachers' Academic Qualifications

5. Teachers' Continuing Professional Development


The College is committed to maximising the potential of its staff members and staff training is an integral part in the development of the College.

An induction programme was organised in early September 2012 for our newly recruited teachers. This included discussion on administrative procedures, discipline and information technology, and introduction by individual subject heads concerned. Each was also assigned a mentor who would provide them with guidance and support as they began their new teaching career in St. Paul's College.

Four staff development programmes were organised in 2012-2013. To raise the awareness of teachers' duty of care, Mr. Chong Yiu Kwong, a solicitor as well as a Teaching Fellow in the Department of Educational Policy and Leadership, LLM in Human Rights and Mediator of the Hong Kong Institute of Education, was invited to give a talk on 31st August, 2012. The second one was provided by The Boys' and Girls' Clubs Association of Hong Kong on 7th September, 2012. It was mainly for Form Teachers and co-Form Teachers on "How to Manage a Class". We were pleased to have a well-experienced teacher Mr. Chan Hon Sum to come to our College to share his experience with us. The third professional development programme was held on 2nd November, 2012. It was a whole day workshop on the topic "Be a Happy and Effective Teacher". The two speakers, Professor Lam Man Ping and Mr. Luk Ka Yin from 'T and T Holistic Growth Centre', had more than twenty years experience in counselling and physiotherapy. In the fourth programme, held on 3rd May, 2013, different professional development activities in different Key Learning Areas were organised. The programmes included visits to Chi Lin Nunnery and Nan Lian Garden, Hong Kong Wetland Park and The University of Hong Kong, lesson study in some KLAs and lesson observation and sharing with other schools.

Apart from the professional development programmes organised by the College, teachers were also encouraged to attend training courses and seminars organised by the Education Bureau and other institutions. Activities attended by teachers included international conferences, seminars, courses, meetings, briefings and experience sharing sessions on school administration, school curriculum and its development, careers, discipline, guidance, moral and civic education in general.

Two Mathematics teachers, Mr. Wu Kai Chiu and Miss Leung Fung Bun, completed the Postgraduate Diploma in Education at the Hong Kong Baptist University in June 2013.



V. OUR LEARNING AND TEACHING

1. Curriculum

(a) Our timetable is based on a 5-day weekly cycle. To help students fully develop their intellectual capabilities, all the academic departments at St. Paul's work together to provide a broad curriculum in accordance with the needs, levels and abilities of the students.

(b) New Senior Secondary Curriculum

Besides the four core subjects, students were allowed to choose 3 subjects from a total of 13 elective subjects. The electives offered to Form 4 students in 2012-2013 included: Economics, Geography, History, Chinese Literature, Chinese History, Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Combined Science, Business, Accounting and Financial Studies, Information and Communication Technology, Music and Visual Arts. There were also regular lessons for Music, Physical Education, Visual Arts and Religious Studies for all students.

A review of the curriculum structure was conducted in 2012-2013. To provide more options for students, the College decided to use the "Student Option Programme" provided by the Education Bureau in designing the block time-tables and assigning elective subjects to S4 students so as to maximize the satisfaction rate of students' choices under the College's physical constraints in 2013-2014.

A talk on the Choice of Subjects at Senior Secondary Level for Form 3 Parents and Students was held on Saturday, 2nd March, 2013. Two booklets, "Senior Students' Handbook" and "New Senior Secondary Curriculum Course Catalogue" were prepared and issued to each Form 3 student. A trial run of the new online subject selection system was held in March after the talk and the mock allocation of elective subjects was based on their Mid-Year Examination results.

Form 3 students were asked to indicate their choices via the NSS Online Subject Selection System in late June and the results were released in early July 2012.

2. Assessment

(a) Both formative assessments and summative assessments were used to assess students' learning. Classworks / formative assessments were used to track students' learning progress over time, build up their confidence and help students to take responsibility of their learning. Formal examinations included a Mid-year Examination and a Final Examination which indicated students' achievements at significant points in their learning.

- (b) There were two classwork assessments and two examinations (1st Classwork, Mid-year Examination, 2nd Classwork and Final Examination) in an academic year for Forms 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 for all subjects except Religious Studies, Computer Literacy, Physical Education, Music and Visual Arts.
- (c) For Form 6, there were two classwork assessments and only one examination in an academic year (1st Classwork, 2nd Classwork and Internal Examination).
- (d) Supplementary Examinations
 Forms 4 and 5 students who failed in the four core subjects in the Final Examination were required to retake the examination during the summer holiday.

3. Homework

- (a) Students were provided with meaningful and challenging homework assignments to reinforce what they had learnt in class. Our homework assignments included:
 - practice exercises to consolidate learning
 - extension assignments to transfer and apply new skills or concepts to new situations
 - creative activities to help students integrate different skills learnt
 - leisure reading activities

Actual time required to complete assignments varied, depending on each students' academic skills and language proficiency.

- (b) Checking F. 1-3 Students' Homework & Tests Online

 To provide parents with more information about the homework / tests assigned on a day
 to day basis, we uploaded the information on our School Intranet for parents to check
 online after 5:00 p.m. each day.
- (c) Late Assignment Recording System (LARS) was used to record names of students in Form 1 and Form 2 who did not hand in their homework/assignments on time.





 - (a) No. of Active School Days (Forms 1-3)


No. of Days with Regular Classes

VI. SUPPORT FOR STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The College values students as individuals and there are a number of teacher teams to provide the necessary support to ensure that all students can get the most out of their experiences at the College.

The Guidance Team and Discipline Team have both adopted a policy of guiding students towards positive behavioural change. Form Teachers were encouraged to work closely with parents, Guidance Team members and the School Social Worker to effect this approach. The Careers Team focused on providing information and advice on career choices and study opportunities for students in all forms. In addition, students were provided with information and guidance about overseas study and assisted in their applications for scholarships, loans and academic and vocational programmes. The Moral and Civic Education Team organised a range of activities, including field trips, visits and camps to foster students' civic awareness. The Other Learning Experiences Team organised a structured and balanced co-curriculum for students with emphasis on community services.

Careers Guidance

To assist students in making informed decisions about their courses of study and career paths, a Careers Inclination Assessment was conducted for Form Six students. A specially designed calendar, highlighting examination dates, was prepared for our students. This calendar, entitled 'The Road to Success', was of great use to our graduating students in focusing their attention on the challenges that they would face. In addition, greater accessibility to crucial selection criteria and university requirements were placed on the College website for easy access. Advice on JUPAS choices was also given to all graduating students.

In the Careers Awareness Week, over twenty alumni came back to the College to share their experience of the workplace with their 'little brothers' at SPC in the first two weeks of November, 2012. The programme helped both the Form Six and other senior students to become exposed to a wider range of tertiary institutions.

A number of student-centred seminars were held during the course of the year, most notably the information session on 'How to Prepare for the Release of the HKDSE Results', in conjunction with the Guidance Team, and the preparation of the Student Learning Profile (SLP) and Other Experiences and Achievements in Competitions/Activities (OEA) materials for their JUPAS applications in conjunction with the Other Learning Experience Team.

The Careers Team and the OLE Team also collaborated with the HK Chamber of Commerce Business-School Partnership Programme. This year we partnered with CLP and had a number of activities which were informative and useful for our students.

The Mentorship Scheme, now in its tenth year of operation, had a number of enthusiastic and supportive members in the Alumni Association. A broadly-based programme was organised in the past year which included Lunchtime Mentorship Programme, Careers Day and the High Table Dinner.

Student Guidance

Guidance work in the College was conducted mainly by the Guidance Team which consisted of the Guidance Mistress, two School Social Workers, an Education Psychologist, a Special Education Coordinator and twenty guidance teachers. To have better coordination of counselling cases in each form, six Guidance teachers were appointed as Form Coordinators. They worked closely with the Convenor and the School Social Workers.

Guidance programmes were organised for students in each form. For junior forms, workshops on "Understanding and Cherishing Life", "Anti-sexual Violence", "No Bullying", "Net Ethics", "Love and Sex" and "Be Smart: Say No to Temptations" were organised. In addition, drama performances on "Sexual Harassment" and "Healthy Information for a Healthy Mind" were also staged. A Careers-Guidance Programme on HKDSE Subjects Selection was delivered to Form Three students in February. For senior forms, talks on "Time Management" and "Stress Management" were arranged. To help Form Six students prepare for the release of HKDSE results, the Team organised a talk in collaboration with the Careers Team and Hok Yau Club on 5th July 2013.

Life Education Programmes were organised for junior forms. The themes for Form One Life Education curriculum were 'Showing Respect' and 'Developing Good Habits'. For the Form 2, we invited the Student Health Service of the Department of Health to conduct eight sessions of Adolescent Health Programme. The programme included emotion management, harmonious interpersonal relationship building, communication skills, analytical thinking, problem solving skills, time and financial management, self acceptance, self-care and In addition, our Educational Psychologist and School Social Workers appreciation. designed and offered Life Education lessons on study skills and net ethics respectively to Mr. Cheung Hui Fung, our School Social Worker, were responsible for conducting sex education workshops in the first term. In the second term, they helped students gain more self-understanding and explore the career world so that they could make informed choices for the HKDSE subject selection. Furthermore, to develop better self-discipline and enhance class spirit, Life Education Camps were organised for 1E and 2A students by the Form teachers and the Guidance Team in March at the Salvation Army Ma Wan Youth Camp. The camps were positively received by the teachers and the students.

In order to enhance self-discipline and perseverance in our Form One students, three Form One breakthrough camps, with the theme of "Self-discipline, Perseverance, Care" at the Don

Bosco Youth Training Centre in Cheung Chau were organised in September and October. All Form One students, thirty one peer mentors, School Social Workers, Form Teachers and Co-Form Teachers participated in the camps. In addition, adjustment workshops were arranged for the whole form in September.

Aiming to enhance students' concentration, communication skills, creativity and self understanding through basic training in drama and performance, a drama counselling group was organised again this year. With the help of Miss Moni Wong, an experienced drama therapist from the Link Education, two counselling groups were organised. In the first stage, nine students in junior forms attended ten training sessions from December to April. As the participants were highly engaged, another Form One group, with eight participants, was organised in May. In these groups, students were guided to discuss daily life issues, including their relationship with families, peers and teachers. Afterwards, a short drama or role play was performed. Through acting, it was easier for students to develop empathy towards others. Their problem solving skills were also sharpened through regular practice in the counselling group.

Besides guidance programmes and counselling groups, individual counselling work was offered to students by Mr. Cheung Hui Fung, Alvin and Miss Wong Yuk Lan, Vienna, the College Social Workers. They were responsible for handling most individual counselling cases. Some Guidance teachers, who acted as case counsellors, were responsible for early intervention work.

To have better coordination of counselling cases in each form, six Guidance teachers were appointed as Form Coordinators. They worked closely with the Convenor and the School Social Workers. In addition, family counselling service was offered to parents.

Mr. Wong Yu Kwan, Danny, the Educational Psychologist from the HKEP Services Centre Limited, stationed regularly at the College for about two days per week between September and June to provide psycho-educational assessments for students who experienced learning, or emotional difficulties. Both individual counselling and intervention sessions were provided. In addition, he gave advice to teachers who handled students' problems and concerns during case conferences and case consultations. He worked closely with Miss Kwong Kit Yee, Special Education Coordinator, to make special examination arrangements and review the current policy for students with special educational needs. With the help of Mr. Wong, a few students were recruited as Mental Health Ambassadors in the second term to promote an understanding and caring culture at the College. They edited and produced a leaflet on stress management and study skills which was distributed to all students in the College before the final examination.

The College had a dedicated Resource Centre for visually impaired students, and had a long history of partnership with the Ebenezer School for the Blind. Visually impaired students also had a tutor who liaised with staff to assist in providing notes and materials so that suitable curricular arrangements and learning aids and support services could be allocated and incorporated appropriately.

Student Discipline

Various activities were organised to raise the awareness of parents, teachers and students on the importance of good discipline.

In early September, the Prefects' Council organised an orientation programme for Form One students to familiarise them with the new school environment. Also in September, Miss Choi Suet Fong, the School Liaison Officer of the Police Community Relations Office Western District was invited to give talks to the Form One to Form Three students. The topics included 'Sexual offence', 'School Bullying', 'Theft' and 'Triad Activities'. The College also joined the twin project "Police-Prefect Mentorship Programme" organised by the Western and Southern Police District and other secondary schools. Eighteen of our prefects were appointed as the ambassadors of the programme to help create a harmonious school environment. To raise students' awareness of the danger of drug abuse, an Anti-Drug Abuse Quiz was organised for Form One students in March 2013.

Two former Head Prefects, Professor Hung Leung Kim (Head Prefect of 1973-1974) and Judge Ko King Sau, Justin (Head Prefect of 1985-1986) were invited to their alma matar. Professor Hung Leung Kim teaches in the Department of Orthopaedics and Traumatology of the Chinese University of Hong Kong. Judge Ko is the District Judge and the Presiding Officer of Lands Tribunal. Professor Hung shared with students on leadership while Judge Ko shared his view on justice and the rule of law.

In July 2013, the Prefects' Council and the Students' Association co-organised the Exploring Leadership Tour to the United States of America for twenty eight prefects & S.A. Officials. The tour was led by Mr. Li Yu Hin, the Discipline Master and Mr. Chan Chi Chiu, the Chief Advisor of the Students' Association. Students had the opportunity to attend a lecture at the Headquarters of the United Nations which was about the structure and missions of the United Nations and joined the Wall Street Experience Tour led by the Wall Street Insider. Our boys had also visited Princeton University for an information session and campus tour.

The Discipline Team and the Guidance Team had co-organised the Leadership Training Course for our Form Three students from late June to early July 2013. The course aimed to equip students with enhanced communication skills and develop their leadership qualities.

Christian Activities

During 2012-2013 academic year, the whole school met on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays for morning assemblies from September until mid-February. The assemblies followed the usual format of a hymn, a Bible reading and a talk and concluded with a time of prayer and the Grace. Each day of the week the assembly would have a different theme. Mondays were the 'Principal's Assembly', Wednesdays were the 'Guest Speaker Assembly', Thursday the 'Worship Assembly' and Friday the 'College Assembly' when various school organisations and groups were asked to prepare a presentation. These included several impressive and entertaining audio-visual presentations by various student groups. We were particularly blessed during the year with several special assemblies prepared by the Music Department with instrumental and choral performances of the highest standard.

The liturgical life of the College had also included the celebration of the major Christian seasons and festivals, especially Christmas and Easter. Special services were held in the College hall for Christmas and Easter. Both these services were celebrated according to the Anglican liturgical tradition.

The College also held its two Heritage Services for Form One and Form Two. These services were held in St. Paul's Church, Glenealy and St. John's Cathedral and were designed to help the students to reflect upon and celebrate the historical links between the College and the Diocese of Hong Kong Island.

The Christian Union still formed the backbone of the Christian activities in the College. It met twice a week during lunchtime on Wednesdays and Fridays. The Christian Union was divided into two groups. The Juniors consisted of Form One and Form Two, whereas the Seniors consisted of the rest. The Juniors met for a session that included team building games, video presentations and Bible study. The Senior group concentrated more on cell groups, which discussed a particular topic of interest chosen by the boys.

In addition, a Gospel Camp was held for the Form One students in January 2013 and a Gospel week was organised in April 2013.

Civic and Moral Education

Talks, exhibitions, visits and competitions were organised to facilitate the personal and social development of the students.

A talk by UNICEF about Natural Disasters and Children was organised for the Form Three students early in the school year. An ICAC Drama was organised for the Form Three students in January. The theme of the drama this year was entitled "A bad guy from

Venice". Anti-corruption messages and positive values like honesty, integrity and cleanliness were disseminated to students. A talk, titled "Planning of Our Neighbourhood: district planning concepts/ practices", by the Planning Department was held for the Form One students in February. Students gained some first-hand information about the design and planning of our neighbourhood, Kennedy Town and the Western District. A two-day exhibition on Urban Design of Hong Kong was also held at the Bonham Road School Entrance in the same period of time. A talk about the Extremes on Earth was given to the Form Four and Five students in late June.

The College was honoured to have two special guests giving talks in this school year. Mr. Kevin Zervos, SC, Director of Public Prosecutions introduced the outline of the criminal justice system of Hong Kong to our Junior students. He also discussed legal issues with the students. Another special guest was Mr. Henry Tang, the former Chief Secretary for Administrative of HKSAR. Mr. Tang had a discussion with the Form Two and Three students that covered his personal experience, the development of the HKSAR and the Mainland.

Students were given opportunities to participate in civic-education related competitions. Eleven students joined the "WE LOVE HK" Chinese writing competition. The topic was "As a Decent People". Chung Cheuk Heng, Victor (6F) received a merit prize. Some students also joined an English writing competition organised by Hok Yau Club. A number of Form One students joined a bookmark design competition, "Caring Family", organised by the Social Welfare Department of Central and Western District. Wan Yik Hay (1C) was the second runner-up in the competition.

Two Form Three classes visited the Hong Kong Museum of Coastal Defence and a Form One class had a field study in To Kwa Wan and Kowloon City. Students had a chance to know more about the past, the present and the future of Hong Kong. An Oxfam Program was also organised for 3E within their curriculum.

Outward Bound Programme

All Form Four students took part in the 5-day Outward Bound Training Programme in April 2013. Under the supervision of Mr. Wong Wai Hou, the Other Learning Experiences Master, nine students were selected to be the members of the organizing committee. Over a hundred students opted for the sea expedition while the other forty chose the land adventure. Strong teamwork and courage was required to cope with a series of physical and mental challenges. The programme included a variety of team building exercises, outdoor challenges, structured experiential learning and debriefing sessions. It concluded with the personal assessment by the trainer, the final review and the planning session for participants to set up plans to consolidate their learning. The Outward Bound Training Programme

offered students opportunities to leave their comfort zone and engage in different challenging activities

Other Learning Experiences

In 2012-2013, in addition to dozens of the internal Other Learning Experiences (OLE) activities organized by colleagues, clubs, teams and departments, over fifty OLE activities were offered to senior students in collaboration with many external partners. These included U-Hearts, Christian Action, Caritas Hong Kong, Lions, Outward Bound Hong Kong, Sowers Action, ORBIS, Wofoo Social Enterprises, Hong Kong Union for Young Leaders, St. John's Cathedral, UNICEF, Retina Hong Kong, Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups, YMCA of Hong Kong, Hong Kong Arts Development Council, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong Baptist University, The University of Hong Kong and The Hong Kong Council of Social Service.

Targets for the year were set to promote drama as another prominent co-curricular activity in addition to music and sport; develop student leadership qualities by providing them with more local and overseas training; extend opportunities for students to participate in broader community service; enhance the "SPC" culture at the College, and encourage students to set goals for their co-curricular activities. VII. HOME SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP

The St. Paul's College Parent Teacher Association (PTA) was established in October 1994. In 2012-2013, five hundred and five parents joined the Association. The 19th Annual General Meeting of the PTA was held on 20th October, 2012. At the meeting, eight parent members were elected to serve on the Executive Committee. At the first executive committee meeting held after the AGM, Mr. Leung Tin Ho, David was elected Chairman. Also Miss Huen Wai Fun had kindly agreed to serve as Honorary Auditor.

A talk was organised on 19th January, 2013 and Mr. Andrew Ma, an enterprise business consultant, was invited as the speaker. The title of the talk was "Are High EQ Students More Successful than High IQ Students?". The talk focused on the fine points of parenting skills and was well received by an audience of more than one hundred and fifty parents and teachers. The tea gathering after the talk enabled teachers and parents to share their views on the topic.

Members of the PTA attended the annual Sports Day of the College on 12^{th} March, 2013. Three parent teams competed against two teacher teams in the classic 4 x 100 m Parent-Teacher Invitation Relay. One of the parent teams won the silver medal. In another event, eight families took part in a 2 x 100 m relay race. Both parents and sons enjoyed the fun of competing in sports.

The PTA organised a family outing in late March to the northern New Territories with the objective of studying the cultural heritage of Hong Kong. One hundred and forty two parents and children from forty eight families, travelled to the former closed areas of Sha Tau Kok. In the morning, the group visited traditional Hakka villages, old ancestral halls and derelict military bunkers used by the Japanese Army during the Second World War. In the afternoon, the participants enjoyed breath-taking landscapes at Luk Keng and famous views of bird habitats of the Starling Inlet. The highlight of the tour was a traditional "poon choi" feast, accompanied by live entertainment, a performance of Cantonese folk songs and story-telling of the ancient Hakka folklores. A photo competition was organised in addition to the outing. Three prizes for the winners were presented during the AGM on 19th October, 2013. The winning photos would be published in the next issue of the PTA Newsletter.

The PTA also organised a volunteering service to visit low-income families in the Western District to promote healthy family life for the community on 11th May, 2013. There were fifty-eight parents and students who joined the visit. They brought along gifts to these families.


A whole day Joint School Parent Education Workshop, hosted by our College this year, was held on 6th July, 2013. The workshop was jointly organised with the PTA of King's College.

The theme of the workshop was "What Your Child Needs to Know about Self-management and Self-control". It was attended by more than a hundred parents of both schools. The workshop was divided into two sessions with a break for lunch. The morning session was a talk given by Dr. Wat Wai Ho, a professional family therapist. The afternoon session commenced with case studies led by social workers from the Caritas Mok Cheung Shui Kun Community Centre. At the end of the session, the social workers provided parents with practical ways of building self-management strategies for their children. The Workshop was well received by all the participants.



1. Student Participation in Inter-school Events




2. Student Participation in Uniform/Social and Voluntary Service Groups




3. Students' Physical Development

IX. MAJOR CONCERNS (Achievements and Reflections)

1. Teaching and Learning: Toward greater collaboration

- Strengthen a collaborative culture
 - ♦ Collaborative Curriculum Planning lessons were incorporated in the timetable for the four core subjects to provide opportunities for teachers to work together to plan lessons and to review students' work.
 - ♦ Peer lesson observations were conducted in some departments.
 - → The Computer Studies Department and the Liberal Studies Department joined the School-based Curriculum Development Support Services provided by the Education Bureau in 2012-2013. Feedback from the teachers involved had been extremely positive.
 - ♦ The English Department joined the Refined English Enhancement Scheme (REES). The main task was to align the Form 4 and From 5 English oral syllabus with topics taught in Liberal Studies and Religious Studies. A series of lessons for Form Four oral classes was created and tried out in 2012-2013. The teachers in the team would continue to develop materials for F.5 in 2013-2014 and would seek different avenues to strengthen cross-curriculum collaboration.
 - ♦ A School-based Assessment (SBA) plan outlying topics to be covered and SBA assessment schedule in each subject was compiled. This provided a more balanced schedule for the core and major subjects in Form 5 and Form 6.
 - ❖ To strengthen liaison with our network of local and overseas schools, a number of exchange programmes were arranged for both students and teachers.
 - Twelve students from Christ Church Grammar School in Perth visited St. Paul's College from 21st September, 2012 to 29th September, 2012. Twelve of our students returned the visit from 15th February, 2013 to 23rd February, 2013.
 - The College received two students from Phorms Mitte Bilingual School in Berlin from 24th September, 2012 to 12th October, 2012. Three of our students were sent to Phorms Mitte Bilingual School in Berlin for an exchange programme from 4th February, 2013 to 24th February, 2013.
 - Six students and three teachers from the Trinity-Pawling School in New York visited St. Paul's from 9th March, 2013 to 17th March, 2013.
 - Twenty students accompanied by two teachers from Anglican High School in Singapore visited our College from 17th March, 2013 to 21st March, 2013.
 - One Form 5 student, accompanied by a teacher, attended the IBSC Student Forum held at St. Christopher's School in Richmond, Virginia, USA from 26th June, 2013 to 7th July, 2013.

- Two Form 4 students attended the Global Alliance of Leading-Edge Schools (GALES) Tilshift Youth Summit 2013 held in Raffles Institution, Singapore from 16th June, 2013 to 22nd June, 2013.
- A group of teachers from Wah Yan College Kowloon, led by the Principal Dr. John Tan Kang, visited our College on Friday, 26th October, 2012. They had a sharing session with some of our senior students and teachers.
- Two professors and 12 students taking the Master of Arts in Teaching Chinese as an International Language Programme from the Hong Kong Institute of Education visited the College on Wednesday, 31st October, 2012. They observed some Chinese lessons and had a sharing session with our Chinese Language teachers.
- Two teachers attended the IBSC Conference held in Richmond, Virginia from 30th June, 2013 to 3rd July, 2013.

Raising Learning Efficiency

- To address the shortfall in instruction time in some subjects, a review of the current timetable structure was carried out in 2012-2013. Views and comments on some proposed alternative timetable structures were invited from teachers. No consensus was reached on a viable alternative timetable structure that would suit the needs of the students. Further discussions and consultations would be held in the 2013-2014 school year.
- ♦ To cater for the needs of the students, enhancement and enrichment classes were organised by various departments last year.

- ♦ Selected students' artworks were on display at various parts of the school campus.
- ♦ To raise students' awareness of local and international issues, news in English and Putonghua were broadcast in the campus every Tuesday.

2. Curriculum and Assessment: Towards more integration and differentiation

- > Reviews the existing curriculum and assessment practices
 - ♦ A review of the curriculum structure was conducted in 2012-2013. To provide flexibility for students to choose their electives, the College decided to use the "Student Option Programme" provided by the Education Bureau to design a curriculum structure that would best accommodate students' choices. The satisfaction rate achieved was about 88%.
 - ♦ Teachers were encouraged to design assessments that require application of higherorder thinking skills.
 - ❖ In considering the possibility of introducing GCE A-Level as a formal curriculum. a proposed timescale for the implementation of the new curriculum had been drawn up.

3. Management

- > Streamline the operation of the school
 - ♦ A review of the organisational structure of the school was being undertaken to enhance the coordination and collaboration amongst the various teacher teams. Clear aims and scope of work for each team would also be specified.
 - ♦ An evaluation of the current appraisal system was being undertaken to identify areas for improvement.
 - ❖ To strengthen the role of the middle management in the decision making process, regular meetings for all Heads of Department and all Coordinators of Key Learning Areas were held.

- Continue to provide a language rich environment
 - ♦ The 2012-2013 was designated as the Reading Year. A whole school approach to promote reading in the College was adopted. To motivate students to read extensively, the English Department, the Chinese Department and the College Library jointly organised the "Readers of the Year" scheme. Thirty-eight students were awarded the title "Reader of the Year".
 - ♦ The English Department continued to make use of the "An English News Story a Day" programme, an online platform launched by the Sing Tao Publishing Limited, to raise students' awareness of current affairs and improve their reading skills.
 - ♦ The Chinese Department also subscribed to the iLearner Chinese platform and students were required to read one passage a day online.
- For Greater use of Information Technology to enhance efficiency in teaching, learning and administration
 - ❖ The Information Services and Technology Team had been restructured. The new team comprised of four teachers and three IT Technicians. A long term IT plan for the College was being formulated by the team. The team was investigating the greater use of the e-Class platform, the e-learning server and mobile technology.
 - ♦ Teachers were encouraged to use the Intranet to communicate with students and more frequent use of this mode of communication was observed.
 - ❖ Trial run of e-Notice. To provide parents/guardians with information in an environment friendly way, other than uploading the general information to our official webpage, some notices to parents/guardians were sent via the School Intranet starting from November 2012. The notices were uploaded every Friday. Parents/guardians were asked to login to the School Intranet to browse the contents and check the {SIGN} button to acknowledge receipt of the notices.

4. Student support: all for each and each for all

Because of the structural changes brought about by the 334 reforms, we found that student leadership roles were often thrust upon younger members of the student body. There was also an increased level of stress for students when they had to juggle with different requirements impose on them by the 334 reforms. On top of meeting the stringent requirements of their academic work, senior secondary students had to struggle to cope with the demands from various school-based assessments and Other Learning Experiences. There was a need to strengthen our support for our boys so that both teachers and students can benefit more from the changes. Please refer to Section VI SUPPORT FOR STUDENT DEVELOPMENT for programmes, activities and support provided to students.

5. Values Education: a culture of trust and respect based on Christian principles

- Preserve our core values to uphold the St. Paul's College mission and heritage
 - ♦ A whole school approach was adopted to promote positive values amongst the students. The Guidance Team, the Chaplain, the Religious Department, the Moral and Civic Education Team and the Discipline Team worked together to promote the positive values as embodied in the Charter of Rights and Responsibilities. The Charter of Rights and Responsibilities were made known to all stakeholders. A copy of which could be found in the Teachers' Folder, College Handbook and Student Handbook.
 - ♦ Relevance of Christian teaching to the modern world was reinforced through assemblies and Religious Studies lessons.
 - ♦ Leadership workshops, Outward Bound programmes and community service projects were organised for students to reinforce traits of servant leaders.

- ♦ Environmental education was included in Integrated Science, Integrated Humanities, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Geography and Liberal Studies.
- ♦ The three small green steps: "Reduce", "Reuse" and "Recycle" were advocated in the College. Members of the Green Club collected used paper from students on every Tuesday morning. They also collected plastic bottles from students and teachers in the school campus and during major school events such as the Swimming Gala and Sports Day.
- ♦ All Form One to Form Three Environmental Monitors (eighteen in total) participated in the Student Environmental Protection Ambassador Scheme jointly organised by the Environmental Campaign Committee, Environmental Protection Department and the Education Bureau.
- Eight students also joined the 2012-2013 ESD Learning Programme organised by the UNESCO Hong Kong Association from October 2012 to March 2013. The theme of the programme was "Design for the Environment, Nature within Sustainable City". There was an array of inspirational activities including personal skills workshop, design and managing project workshop and a professional tree management workshop for the participants. They also paid a visit to the Zero Carbon building to understand how the building could achieve zero carbon emissions. Their project entitled "Arouse Environmental Protection Awareness through Education" won the Grand ESD Award (Grade 3) and Presentation Award (Grade 3).

Report on the Use of Capacity Enhancement Grant for the School Year 2012-2013

In 2012-2013, a sum of \$846,756.40 was available for use. This included a grant of \$517,084 received for the year together with the top-up fund of \$329,672.40 from the College.

Approximately 82% of the expenses were allocated to the curriculum development. A large portion of the money was spent on hiring an IT technician to help teachers in producing multimedia teaching materials and conducting SBA activities, as well as hiring two clerical staff to relieve part of the teachers' administrative duties.

Around 12% was spent in enhancing students' language proficiency through running debate and speech training courses.

Another 6% was allocated to coping with the diverse needs of students. Enhancement classes for Chinese Languages and Mathematics were arranged for after-school and Saturday mornings for selected students with individual/ special educational needs. In general, students benefited a lot from the Chinese and Mathematics tutorial classes and most of them showed improvement in their performance in the Final Examination.
